DEDICATION

This, the 12th volume of *Palaeohistoria*, contains the papers presented by the participants in the Symposium on the Origins and Inter-relations of the Neolithic Cultures of Western Europe, held at the State University at Groningen 6–11 April 1964, in honour of Professor A.E. van Giffen, and in celebration of his 80th birthday.

The Symposium was, at the same time, one of the events sponsored by the University to commemorate its 350th anniversary.

In the invitation to the Symposium, the future participants were reminded of the key geographical position of the Low Countries; of the fact that researchers in the various lands were sometimes compelled to work with less mutual contact than would be ideal for the study of their problems on a sufficiently broad geographical basis; and of the possibility that certain concepts, developed in America, concerning the mechanics of cultural transmission might prove to be a value for the understanding of the Neolithic in Western Europe. It was suggested that the participants give thought to such questions as the possible occurrence of a level of incipient food production; the diffusion of Neolithic influences among Mesolithic groups; the causes of ecological diversity within cultures, *etc.* In the event, these suggestions as to approach received less attention than one had hoped. We are, however, confident that the Symposium did make a positive contribution toward a better understanding among researchers of various schools and traditions.

The initiators were inspired by the *Colloque Atlantique*, so successfully organized by P.-R. Giot at Rennes in 1961, to give this meeting the title of Second Atlantic Colloquium. Implicit in this designation is our sincere hope that others will in the future provide opportunities for the series to continue.

The members of the scientific and technical staff of the B.A.I. worked together intensively for the organization of the Symposium. Sponsors and participants are happy now to be able to present this volume to the founder and for 32 years the Director of the Biologisch-Archaeologisch Instituut, and the founder and first Editor of this Journal – Albert Egges van Giffen.




Fig. 1. Répartition de la céramique cardiale et du Néolithique ancien dans le midi de la France.
