

Groningen Journal of International Law (GroJIL) (Articles)

Author Guide

1. Publishing Profile

The Groningen Journal of International Law is a peer-reviewed journal with a centralised focus on the paradigm of international law and its developments. We invite writers to focus on what the law could be or should be, and to apply their creativity in presenting solutions, models and theories that in their view would strengthen the role and effectiveness of international law, yet it may come to be defined. To this end, the Journal requires its authors to submit articles written in an exploratory and non-descriptive style. The Groningen Journal of International Law is a peer reviewed publication. Only submissions that fulfil the requirements of this guideline will be peer reviewed. If a submission does not fulfil these conditions it will be rejected.

2. Submissions

All manuscripts should be submitted via email to board@grojil.org.

3. Submission Guidelines

- All manuscripts must be submitted in a word document. Manuscripts in a pdf-file will not enter the peer review process;
- Manuscripts need to be between 7,000 to 15,000 words (excluding footnotes);
- Manuscripts may not have been published or be under consideration for publication elsewhere:
- Only articles in English can be considered for publication. The Journal has a general preference for 'ise' and 'isation' instead of 'ize' and 'ization' with the exception of quotations where the original spelling should be maintained. American authors may also submit articles that deviate from this policy;
- Every article should be accompanied by a short abstract of 200-400 words;
- A short bibliographical note, specifying the author's current affiliation and e-mail address should be provided in the first footnote. This footnote should not be footnote 1, but an asterisk (*).

4. Citation style

The GroJIL uses OSCOLA style. Prospective authors should submit papers using this legal referencing style. The GroJIL editorial team provides the service of correcting the references.

5. Review process





All submissions are read by the Editorial Board. Only those submissions that most likely the fulfil the journal's submission requirements will be sent to the peer reviewers. Submissions that do not fulfil the submission requirements will be rejected without any peer review. For example, if a submission only includes 2,000 words, whereas the minimum requirement of words is 7,000 words, the submission will not enter the peer review process and shall be rejected. Each submission that is sent for formal review will undergo a double-blinded peer review. Reviewers will anonymously fill in a peer review form, make suggestions and comments in the submitted manuscript, and suggest 'acceptance with minor revisions', 'acceptance with major revisions' or 'rejection'. The Editorial Board will make decisions accordingly within 4 months, and retains the right to request the author to make revisions in light of academic standard. Final decisions on publication will be made within 6 months. The GroJIL tries to be as expeditious as possible in reporting back to authors, yet evaluations from experts in specific fields cannot always be as prompt, so delays are at times inevitable. As such, authors are expected to be aware of possible delays in publication. The author retains the right to withdraw their submission from the GroJIL.
